




What Is Drug Diversion?

Deflection of prescription drugs from medical sources into the illegal market:

- Can occur at any point in the distribution process
- Can lead to significant health and legal consequences
- Has financial implications

Why Are Drugs Diverted?

- Intentional abuse of drugs
 - Recreation
 - Addiction
- Self-medicating
- Alleviation of withdrawal symptoms
- Monetary gain

- Theft

- False credentials
- Illicit prescribing

Summary of Drug Diversion Issues

- Common types of drug diversion
 - o Forgoing treatment, Rx under false pretense, stolen Rx pad, false Rx, doctor shopping
- Commonly diverted drugs
 - o Depressants, opioids, stimulants
 - Common drug diversion behaviors
 - Cash payment, avoid pharmacist/prescriber, incomplete/inaccurate information
 - Actions to prevent drug diversion
 - o PDMP, training, drug disposal
